There being no quorum, the meeting was adjourned for 15 minutes and re-convened as provided by the Constitution.

1. OPENING REMARKS

The President, Dr Lee Suan Yew, called the meeting to order at 3.00 pm. He welcomed all the members who were present.

2. MINUTES OF THE 16TH ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING HELD ON 2 AUGUST 1987

The following amendments were made:

Page 4 item 7, to substitute "accepted" for "welcomed"

Page 4 item 8, to substitute "nominated" for "proposed"

Dr Wong Heck Sing proposed that the minutes together with the amendments be adopted. Dr James Chang Ming Yu seconded.

3. MATTERS ARISING

3.1 *Membership drive*

Five hundred recruitment drive brochures have been mailed to non-members whose names were obtained from the Government gazette. The response was not encouraging, with only eighteen new members being recruited which was below the targetted number of 50.

3.2 *Membership Fees*

As there was no quorum, the proposed resolution of Council that membership subscription be raised had to be postponed till the next AGM. Nevertheless, the President felt that the house should proceed to discuss the issue.

He reminded members that in 1987, Council had given thought to raising subscription but decided to shelve it for a year. However, since the College has moved to larger premises, running costs have increased. Two options were proposed to meet this problem. One was to raise either the subscription fees or course fees. Dr Loh made reference to page 24 of the 1987 — 1988 Annual Report and felt that raising fees on subscription would enable the Council to avoid having to raise fees for future CME courses.

To a question raised by Dr Wong Heck Sing as to whether the resolution to increase membership fees was proposed by the Council or the Finance Committee, the President replied that it was both. He further stressed that the recurrent expenditure must be met by current revenue.

Dr Wong proposed that the membership fees be raised for all categories of members except overseas members as the latter do not participate in the College activities. He also proposed that Article 7 Section 2 be amended to allow Council to make decisions. The House accepted both proposals.

Members' views were sought. From the show of hands, more were in favour of raising the subscription fees: 11 preferred to raise course fees and keep the subscription low while 22 opted for an increase in subscription and modulating CME course fees.

The Honorary Treasurer pointed out that as the Singapore Medical Council will be implementing voluntary CME, it would be to our members' interest to keep the course fees low.

The President assured members that fees would have to be raised, not for monetary purposes but as far as possible, to keep our reserves for the use of the College.

4. ANNUAL REPORT 1987-1988

- 4.1 Council had accepted the resignation of Dr Yeo Siam Yam with effect from 30.6.88, Dr Leong Vie Chung was nominated Council Member as from 3.7.88.
- 4.2 Dr James Chang pointed out that Dr Frederick Samuel's name had been omitted in the report of the Finance Committee.
- 4.3 Dr Lee Suan Yew reported on the Postgraduate Medical Library which is jointly run by the College and the Academy of Medicine. Through its efforts, the Library Committee has been successful in fund raising. Of the promised donation of \$1.6 million, \$1.3 million have been received. The Library provides an on-line communication link with Medline and a CD-ROM for literature searching.

There was a brisk debate with regard to extending the opening hours of the library. To do so would involve a need for more staff. Dr James Chang Ming Yu cautioned that lengthening the opening hours may not result in more doctors using the library, as was the case with the Reuben Meyer Library. The library committee will look into their request.

At this juncture, members were told that the Reuben Meyer Library will remain as a loan library and members taking the MCGP examination would benefit from it. The objective was to improve on the stock of Family Medicine books and to upgrade the library into one of the best Family Medicine collections in Singapore. An anonymous donation of \$2,000 had been received. It was hoped that more will come forward to donate.

5. REPORT OF STANDING COMMITTEES

5.1 *Board of Censors*

There were 10 applications for the 1988 MCGP examination but one withdrew due to family commitments. The Censor-in-chief, Dr Lim Kim Leong reported that the Censors Board together with the Council have agreed on the 2-year Vocational Training Programme for Family Physicians being recognised as fulfilling one of the requirements for the examination. To Dr Jason Yap's question on whether doctors could select to register only for the sessions relevant to them, Dr Lim explained that for administrative purposes, it was best to charge by the module. Dr Huan Meng Wah enquired over the low percentage of candidates sitting for the MCGP when 150 doctors have been attending the CME sessions. Dr Lim replied that we should note the number who took the exams because it has increased over the years. Currently, those who will be sitting for the exams are all practising GPs and one is from the Primary Health Care. The standard set is also high.

On 2 June 1988, the first batch of trainees have started on the Vocational Training Programme. A Steering Committee was formed to look into this 2-year programme. This committee comprises 2 representatives from the Ministry of Health, 2 from the College of General Practitioners and 2 from the Department of Community, Occupational & Family Medicine, the National University of Singapore.

Dr Lee Suan Yew stressed that for the first time, the College is having a proper training scheme. If this proves to be successful, there are plans for an annual intake of trainees. At this point, Dr Lee thanked the past Censors-in-Chief, namely Dr James Chang and Dr Evelyn Hanam for their good work. He also paid tribute to Dr Wong Heck Sing. Through his foresight, the Ministry of Health has begun to realize the importance of the MCGP examination.

5.2 *Continuing Medical Education*

The Singapore Medical Council had suggested that a more structured programme for doctors in Singapore be developed. Details are being worked out by various medical bodies represented on the SMC CME coordinating committee. Announcements are expected to be made by the Singapore Medical Council soon.

Dr Wong Heck Sing proposed that the CME sessions focus more on general practice work. He felt that there was no necessity for detailed specialist knowledge. Dr Lee Suan Yew replied that the Committee has been told to tailor it according to the needs of general practitioners. Dr James Chang said that it was important to select the best speakers. Dr Huan Meng Wah requested for more O & G courses.

5.3 *Undergraduate Teaching*

Dr Goh Lee Gan informed the House that with the academic representation of Family Medicine in the University, the subject is now better recognised. He thanked past and present generations of clinical tutors and council members for their contributions.

5.4 *Research*

Dr Paul Chan reminded members of the One-Day National Morbidity Survey on 12 July. To Dr Leong Vie Chung's question as to why it was to be conducted on a Tuesday, Dr Chan explained that it was a compromise between a very heavy and therefore atypical Monday and a quiet Wednesday.

On the research on diabetic control, Dr Wong Heck Sing asked if one could really arrive at a conclusion on data collected over a three month survey. Dr Chan explained that the study is on diabetic control of patients who have been receiving medication regularly from their general practitioners for a period of at least three months.

Dr Lee Suan Yew said that we were fortunate to have COFM because more research on general practice could be studied and published and this would enhance the image of the College at international conferences.

5.5 *Publications*

The October/December issue of the Singapore Family Physician will carry the proceedings of the College's first Scientific Conference. The Publications Chairman thanked members for their contributions towards the publication.

5.6 *Practice Management*

Various forms have been developed such as the full medical check-up forms which are currently being sold at \$10 for 100 sheets. Also available are the Metabolic and Diabetic Flow Charts and the Child Development Charts, at no charge, from Bohringer Mannheim and Milupa respectively.

6. **AUDITED ACCOUNTS AS AT 31 MARCH 1988**

6.1 The Honorary Treasurer stressed that the mainstay of income for the College came from the CME courses. Dr Wong Heck Sing asked if interests from the reserves could be set aside for development purposes. Dr Lee replied that the interests will be used to run the College.

6.2 Dr Lee appealed to members for their support for the College's first Annual Scientific Conference. If proved successful, it would be another source of income.

6.3 Dr Moti Vaswani sought clarification on the increase in items of expenditure in the Financial Report. On the subject of refreshments, Dr Loh explained that this was money spent on tea and cakes for the teaching seminars.

6.4 Dr Wong Heck Sing informed members that in the past, it had been the practice of council members to use their personal money on entertainment. He proposed that a budget be decided upon for entertainment. Dr Loh suggested a sum of \$2,000 on a trial basis. All agreed. This was proposed by Dr Ng Eng Lim and seconded by Dr Richard Ng.

6.5 Dr Lee Suan Yew congratulated the Honorary Treasurer for his good work.

7. ELECTION OF FELLOW

7.1 Dr Paul S M Chan was proposed Fellow of the College. This was unanimously accepted by the house. Dr Chan's nomination was proposed and accepted by the Censors Board, the Fellowship Committee and the College Council before it was tabled at the AGM.

8. ANY OTHER BUSINESS

8.1 *Victor Louis Fernandez Fellowship Fund*

It now stood at \$19,000. Dr Wong Heck Sing wanted to know what Council intended to do with the money. Dr Lee replied that six trainees on the Vocational Training programme have been awarded the Victor Louis Fernandez Fellowship Fund grant.

Dr Lee thanked the House for their participation at the meeting. He also thanked the Council for their hard work and sacrifice in the past year and the Secretariat for their administrative support.

9. VOTE OF THANKS

Dr James Chang Ming Yu proposed a vote of thanks to the Chair.

The meeting ended at 5.45 pm.

3. FIRST ANNUAL SCIENTIFIC CONFERENCE/MEDITECH EXHIBITION

The College's First Annual Scientific Conference was held on 12 and 13 November 1988 at our premises. The theme was "New Perspectives in General Practice". The Conference drew a total of 160 participants.

The Conference was opened by the Deputy Director of Medical Services [Hospitals], Dr Chew Chin Hin.

The Eleventh Sreenivasan's Oration was delivered by Associate Professor Lee Hin Peng, Head, Department of Community, Occupational & Family Medicine, National University of Singapore. He spoke on "Health for All by the Year 2000: A Singaporean's Perspective".

Concurrently, an Exhibition was held. It attracted 21 pharmaceutical and equipment companies.

The College would like to place on record its thanks to the Chairman, Dr Cheong Pak Yean and members of his Organising Committee for successfully organising the Conference and Exhibition.

4. CONVOCAION AND ANNUAL DINNER

The Convocation & Dinner were held on 13 November 1988 at the Pavilion Inter-Continental Hotel. Our Guest-of-Honour was Dr Adrian Tan Cheng Bock, Member of Parliament for Ayer Rajah.

5. COUNCIL ACTIVITIES

5.1 *Vocational Training in Family Medicine*

A 6-member tripartite Steering Committee comprising 2 representatives from the Ministry of Health, the Department of Community, Occupational & Family Medicine, the National University of Singapore and the College has been formed to oversee the development and running of a vocational training programme in Family Medicine. The Ministry of Health has enlisted 11 of its medical officers in this programme.

5.2 *Tenancy Agreement*

A tenancy agreement was formalised between the Permanent Secretary [Health]/Director of Medical Services and our President, Dr Lee Suan Yew, on 3 October 1988. The tenancy is for a period of ten years from 16 March 1987 at a yearly rental fee of \$12.00.

5.3 *Visit of Delegates from the Royal College of General Practitioners [UK]*

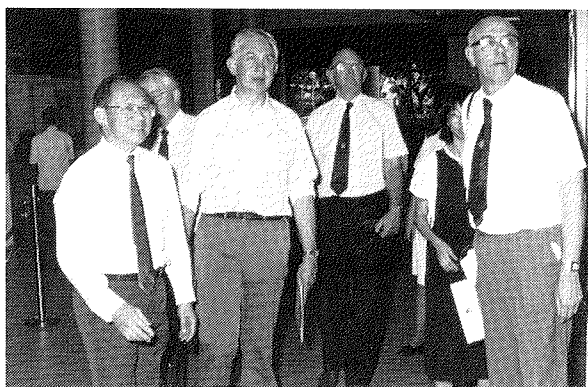

"Standards of Care" — by Dr C Waine



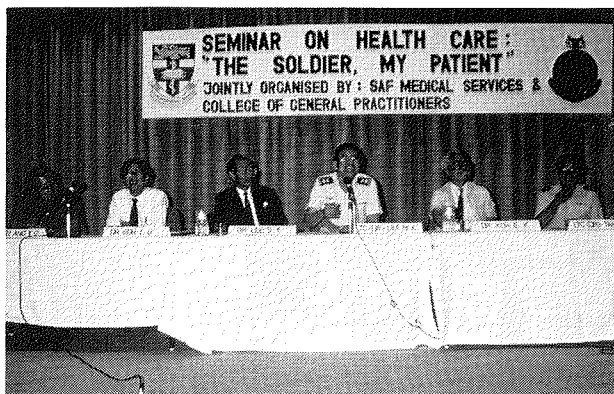

5.4 *Joint Meeting between the Singapore Armed Forces and the College of General Practitioners Singapore*

5.6 *Emergency Calls*

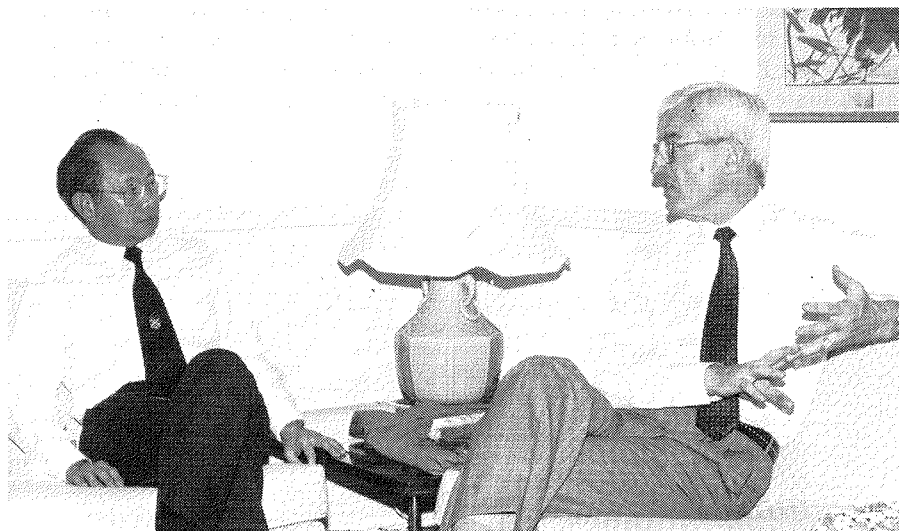

6. THE POSTGRADUATE MEDICAL LIBRARY

EMERGENCY CALLS

PREAMBLE

The Council of the College of General Practitioners, Singapore recognises that there is no perfect system in meeting the need for emergency housecalls. How best this need could be met however, should be systematically reviewed.

The request for an emergency housecall is usually done in a mood of anxiety where there is perceived an element of urgency and danger to life if it is not attended to promptly. Any perceived reluctance or brushing off of the request by the doctor will be seen as being uncaring and this is the cause of the unhappiness in the housecall issue. Understanding and patience on the part of the doctor helps the patient cope with the situation.

A systems approach is taken in this paper to attempt a qualitative analysis of the problems associated with perceived emergency housecalls. On the basis of this analysis, several recommendations are made for action in the short and medium terms.

OBSERVATIONS ON PERCEIVED EMERGENCY CALLS

(1) Size of the problem

Newspaper complaints may represent the vocal minority or may indeed be symptomatic of a big problem. It is possible that the majority of patients who request for perceived emergency calls have their problems dealt with satisfactorily. These do not normally write to the press to thank their doctors. Thus, there is a case for a study on the size of the problem of unmet need for emergency calls through a systematic sampling survey.

(2) Manpower considerations

Presently, the problem of handling emergency calls is borne by general practitioners.

- (a) It is noted that doctors in polyclinics do not look after patients out-of-office hours. Considering that a quarter of the outpatient care is provided by the Government polyclinic, the unmet need, in absolute numbers may be big.
- (b) Many private specialists provide primary care yet do not provide after-hours service. These add to the number of patients with unmet needs.

(3) Doctor-patient-commitment

There is no registered list of patients in Singapore unlike in UK. Patients are free to see as many doctors as they like. Whilst this increases the choice of the doctor considerably, it also erodes the doctor-patient commitment. Patients may indeed view their doctors' services to be one of convenience rather than a relationship of mutual trust and confidence to be nurtured.

(4) Patient-load

The absence of a registered list means that the average doctor in Singapore has a large overlapping list of potential housecall patients. Unlike the UK list of 1800 to 2500 patients in a practice for a single handed GP in Singapore a single handed GP can have a "list" of 10000 patients. It is patently impossible for the single handed GP to attend to every call.

(5) **Long hours**

The Singapore practice is also characterised by the long hours the clinic is open. For the single handed GP, the remaining time for rest, recreation and relating to the family and friends is therefore limited. The provision of a out-of-hours care further reduces this available time. This difficulty may not be appreciated by the public and colleagues in the profession who are not single handed GPs. This however, is not to say that after office hours care should be ignored: the moral responsibility of ensuring that their patients have a defined channel for care remains; the use of a deputising mechanism is one option.

(6) **Real or Perceived Emergencies during office hours**

The demand for the doctor to leave his clinic and attend to a real or perceived emergency during office hours can be difficult to satisfy. The doctor should be given the freedom to balance the need of the patients waiting to see him and that outside the clinic. Many doctors have dealt with the problem by giving the patient the following options: (a) bring the patient to the clinic and be seen without delay; or (b) see another doctor nearby, or (c) go to the hospital.

(7) **Part of a system**

The housecall, the emergency unit in hospital and the ambulance service should be regarded as components of one system. Viewed this way, the exercise is how each component could contribute effectively to the whole system of providing the needed care efficiently, effectively and economically.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The short term

- (1) All health care providers of primary care are morally responsible for providing out-of-hours care for their patients, either directly or through some privately arranged deputising mechanism until such time that a deputising service can be set up.

In the private sector, this should apply to (a) general practitioners and (b) to private specialists who provide primary care. It is to be emphasised that private specialists who provide primary care *should* undertake to provide out-of-hours care for their patients. Those private specialists who see only referred cases will depend on the referral general practitioner to provide the out-of-hours care.

In the government sector, the provision of out-of-hours care for patients seen in the polyclinics, which is uncatered for at the moment, should be studied.

- (2) The concept of going straight to the accident & emergency unit in the case of difficult emergencies like severe injury, severe heart attacks and circulatory collapse should be widely disseminated since these problems cannot be dealt with satisfactorily in the outpatient context.

The health education pamphlet by the Training & Health Education Department of the Ministry of Health on how to recognise emergencies is a step in the right direction. Not only will the ability on the part of the patient to recognise emergencies help him in the effective use of the accident and emergency unit effectively, it will help him in deciding when to call the general practitioner.

Understandably, the lay person may not be able to distinguish between what is and what is not an emergency in some instances. The doctor should show understanding and patience.

- (3) The public perception of the doctor's inalienable duty to make a house-call on request should be examined and a Ministry's stand made.

It has to be noted that the doctor practising alone in the midst of a busy clinic has an equal duty to those patients awaiting his attention. This is a very real problem, and he will have to exercise his judgement as to where he is more urgently needed. The patient has to be clear on this concept.

The practical issue of a patient totally unknown to the doctor, especially in the middle of the night and to a strange address should also be examined. Considerations of personal security must be taken into account. Sufficiently unpleasant incidents have happened in the past to make doctors take these considerations seriously. This issue reinforces the concept of the need for a family doctor.

- (4) A study should be made of the size of the problem of unmet need for emergency housecalls. This could perhaps be made by the Ministry of Health. The College, through its Research Committee will be pleased to collaborate if it can be of help. Such information will be useful to the public and the Government in the sort of actions that should be taken.
- (5) A good ambulance service is already available in the government sector. That in the private sector could be improved to support the private hospitals.

The medium term

- (1) The need for a deputising service, the feasibility and concepts related to its provision should be studied. The British model provides some idea of how it could be organised and run. Perhaps a task force could be set up to study the subject.
- (2) The Japanese model of out-of-hours and holiday provision of emergency primary care is another alternative to consider, either for patients in the government sector or for all patients. This could be studied by the same task force for the idea of a deputising service.

**MEMORANDUM OF
UNDERSTANDING FOR

MEDICAL LIBRARY**

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

THIS MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING is made the day of 1989 Between the Academy of Medicine, Singapore a company having its registered office at College of Medicine Building, 16 College Road, #01-01, Singapore 0316 (hereinafter called "the Academy") of the one part And the College of General Practitioners, Singapore a society having its registered office at College of Medicine Building, 16 College Road, #01-02, Singapore 0316 (hereinafter called "the College") of the other part.

WHEREAS:—

- (1) The Academy has entered into an agreement with the Government of the Republic of Singapore dated the day of 1989 (hereinafter called "the Agreement") for the tenancy *inter alia* of the First Floor Mezzanine Level of the College of Medicine Building, 16 College Road, Singapore 0316 (hereinafter called "the premises").
- (2) The Academy has been allowed by the Government of the Republic of Singapore to utilise the premises to run a library with the College.
- (3) The Academy and the College are desirous of entering into this Memorandum of Understanding for the purpose of laying down certain guidelines in respect of the premises and with respect to all matters pertaining to the running and the maintaining of a library generally (hereinafter collectively called "the library project").

The parties hereby agree to the following guidelines which shall be adhered to as closely as possible:-

1. The Committee

- 1.1 A library management committee (hereinafter called "the Committee") shall be responsible for seeing to all matters relating to the library project and in dealing with matters in respect of the premises.
- 1.2 The Committee shall report to the respective councils of the Academy and the College.

2. The Composition of the Committee

- 2.1 The Committee shall comprise of the following:-
 - (a) 4 members (of whatever category) from the Academy; one of whom shall be the current Master of the Academy and the remaining three shall be appointed by the Council of the Academy;
 - (b) 4 members (of whatever category) from the College; one of whom shall be the current President of the College and the remaining three shall be appointed by the Council of the College;
 - (c) one representative from the Permanent Secretary of Health's office and appointed by the said office;
 - (d) one representative from the Vice Chancellor of the National University of Singapore's office and appointed by the said office; and
 - (e) three other persons whom, except in the case of the first Committee, shall be appointed by the outgoing Committee.
- 2.2 The post of Chairman of the Committee shall be alternated between the Master of the Academy and the President of the College who shall each hold the post for alternative periods of one year.

3. Term

- 3.1 The term of each Committee member shall be for a period of 2 years. Retiring Committee members may be reappointed.
- 3.2 Any vacancies occurring in the Committee through death resignation or any other cause of a member shall be filled by the reappointment by the relevant appointor (where applicable) and in the case of a vacancy with respect to the person(s) mentioned in Clause 2.1 (e), the remaining members of the Committee shall be entitled to make the appointment(s) by a majority of votes. Any new member shall retain office (including where applicable, the post of Chairman) so long only as the vacating member would have retained the same if no vacancy had occurred.

4. **Honorary Secretary and Honorary Treasurer**

There shall be an Honorary Secretary and an Honorary Treasurer both of whom shall be Committee members appointed by the majority of the Committee members one of whom shall be from the Academy (other than the Master) and the other from the College (other than the President) and the posts shall be alternated between persons from the Academy and the College. The term of the Honorary Secretary and Honorary Treasurer shall each be for 1 year. The duties of the Honorary Secretary shall include the taking and keeping of minutes of meetings and records of the Committee and the duties of the Honorary Treasurer shall include the keeping of such books of account as the Committee may from time to time direct.

5. **Meetings**

- 5.1 The Honorary Secretary shall call for meetings of the Committee at least quarterly.
- 5.2 The Chairman or [2] Committee members may call for a meeting by giving not less than [7] days' notice. Emergency meetings may be called by the Chairman or [2] Committee members at short notice.
- 5.3 No business shall be transacted at any meeting unless a quorum of not less than 50% of the Committee members are present.
- 5.4 If the Chairman is not present at the meeting, the members present shall choose one of their number to be the Chairman of such meeting.
- 5.5 Questions arising at any meeting and decisions to be made shall be determined by a majority of votes. Each member shall have one vote. In the case of an equality of votes, the Chairman of the meeting shall be entitled to a second or casting vote.

6. **Expulsion**

Any member of the Committee whose conduct is felt by the majority of the Committee members, to be such as to render him unfit to be a Committee member may be expelled from the Committee by the other Committee members *subject to the approval of the respective Councils of the Academy and the College.*

7. **Sub-Committees**

- 7.1 The Committee may from time to time appoint ad hoc and/or sub-committees.
- 7.2 [Two] Committee members shall sit on each of the said sub-committees.
- 7.3 The said sub-committees shall report to the Committee and members of the said sub-committees shall have no voting rights.

8. **Accounting**

There shall be maintained proper records of account which shall be available for inspection by any Committee member *and/or any member from the respective councils of the Academy and the College* at any time and a full Statement of Account shall be presented to the Committee and the respective councils of the Academy and College as at the end of each 12 calendar months.

9. **Income and Expenditure**

- 9.1 Gifts and donations of any property (whether movable or immovable) made for the purpose of and/or to be utilised by the library project shall be handed over by the Academy and/or the College (as the case may be), as soon as possible, after receipt, to the Committee. The [Honorary Treasurer] will be responsible for making a receipt out in favour of the relevant party.
- 9.2 An account shall be kept showing the monies and assets handed over by the Academy and the Council respectively. Any expenditure by the Committee for that financial year for the library project shall be spent (as far as is practicable) out of the respective contributions handed over by the 2 parties in the same proportion as their respective contributions bear to the aggregate of the contributions for that financial year.

9.3 (A) bank account(s) shall be opened with any reputable bank and/or finance company. The signatories for the bank accounts and for the purposes of drawing cheques shall be any 2 of the following:

- (1) The Honorary Secretary;
- (2) The Honorary Treasurer;
- (3) The Master; and
- (4) The President.

PROVIDED always that one signatory must be from the Academy and the other from the College.

10. Investment

The monies not immediately required for the purposes of the library project may be invested in any investments permitted by law.

11. Annual Report

An annual report shall be presented to the Committee as at the end of each 12 calendar months.

12. Dissolution

If:-

- (i) the Agreement is determined;
- (ii) the Government of the Republic of Singapore no longer allows the library to be run by the Academy and the College; or
- (iii) it is decided at the respective meetings of the Academy and the College (whether at a general meeting, annual general meeting or extraordinary general meeting) that the library project should be terminated;

all assets belonging to and allocated for the library project shall be given to such body (whether incorporated or not) which is deemed fit by the Committee to take over the library project.

13. Amendments

These guidelines may be amended and/or varied from time to time by the Committee in a meeting by a majority of votes.

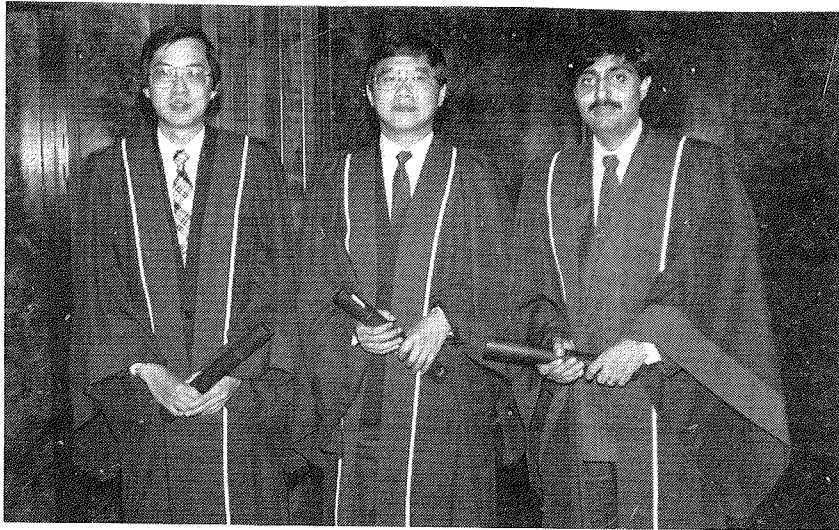

The Censors Board of the College recognises the importance of this teaching programme and has approved it as the alternative requirement for those sitting for the MCGP examination.

Dr Goh Lee Gan is the Director of the programme. The teaching faculty are drawn from both the College and the Department of COFM. At each session, one specialist and one family physician form the resource panel. We are gratified and encouraged by the participation and enthusiasm of the trainees and the general practitioners who voluntarily joined the programme.

It is proposed that the incoming Council considers the formation of a Vocational Training Standing Committee to strengthen the administrative structure of the Family Medicine Teaching Programme.

The committee had to meet only once as most of the activities relating to undergraduate teaching are now co-ordinated by the Department of Community Occupational & Family Medicine, National University of Singapore.

UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAMME

GP Clinical Posting

In the year under review, 40 members participated as Clinical Tutors in the Undergraduate GP Clinical Posting held between April-June 1988 for 3rd Year medical students. The names of these Tutors are given in annex 1.

We are in the process of preparing for the 1989 GP Clinical Posting due in the last week of April and the first two weeks of May 1989. Unlike in previous years, the posting will be conducted in three batches of 60 students, instead of conducting the posting in seven batches. A students' handbook has been prepared and a GP Workshop is due to be held on April 9 1989 to fine-tune the teaching programme.

Introductory course in Family Medicine

This module was taught in January to March 1988 for the 1985/90 cohort and in January to March 1989 for the 1986/91 cohort. Of the 10 lectures, 9 were given by lecturers from the College of GP.

MEETING WITH DR WESLEY FABB

Dr Wesley Fabb met 30 GP clinical tutors on 2nd November 1988 when he was here as HMDP expert on Family Medicine. Papers were presented by Dr Patrick Kee on the "Doctor as a diagnostic instrument" and Dr Wong Wee Nam on the "Doctor as the drug". The importance of these aspects of general practice was agreed. There is also the aspect of clinical competence in teaching about physical illness as is seen in the community setting. The general practitioner's role is like that of a camera lens. Sometimes he observes the situation on wide angle, viewing the patient in his family, work and community setting; sometimes he observes through the telephoto lens, taking a close look at one small part of the problem, for example, the patient's coronary arteries. What makes the general practitioner unique is his capacity to zoom from wide angle to telephoto and back to wide angle to give him a range of perspectives from which to operate. Several views on undergraduate teaching were discussed. The meeting was chaired by Dr Lee Suan Yew.

TEACHING METHODOLOGY COURSE

Two GP Clinical teachers attended the NUS Teaching Methodology course in November 1988. They were Dr Mary Ong and Dr Moti Vaswani. This course was useful in giving them an exposure to teaching methodology.

FUTURE DIRECTIONS

At the meeting on 28 March 1989, future directions of the Committee were discussed. It was felt that although the administration of the undergraduate teaching programme has been given to the Dept. of COFM, the undergraduate committee has a continuing role of providing the necessary liaison between the GP Clinical tutors and the Dept of COFM and of assisting in the provision of resource material etc that the GP Clinical teachers may need.

In the year under review the Committee held two formal meetings to discuss various matters affecting its work.

It completed the write up of two research papers following the completion of the project on "A Study of Diabetes Mellitus in General Practice". As mentioned in last year's report, the study covered the period from 1 December 1987 to 28 February 1988.

It successfully carried out the "One-Day National Morbidity Survey of Outpatients" on 12 July 1988. The Committee would like to thank the Academy of Medicine Singapore, the Singapore Medical Association, the Association of Private Medical Practitioners Singapore and the Ministry of Health, as well as the doctors in the private sector for their assistance in making the study possible. The Committee would also like to thank Dr Shanta Emmanuel for her work in this project.

On 17 July 1988, the Committee participated in the 40th anniversary celebration of the Department of Community, Occupational and Family Medicine [COFM] of the National University of Singapore. COFM is the newly transformed "SMPH" Department of old. Dr S M Chan was invited to chair in one of the scientific sessions on "Research in Family Medicine".

On 12 and 13 November 1988, the Committee was actively involved in the First Annual Scientific Conference of the College. Dr Goh Lee Gan and Dr S M Chan were invited to participate as Conference speakers.

We also took the opportunity during the Conference and Exhibition to conduct a clinical study of Total cholesterol and HDL-cholesterol levels in 25 female and 48 male doctors. We compared these findings with the College's 1977 lipid studies on doctors and will in due time present the final report of the present study.

Work is still in progress regarding our proposed research projects on geriatric patients, hepatitis-B and laboratory tests in GP clinics.

The financial year 1988-1989 was a fair one in the sense that generally the level of income was just able to meet the total expenditure. There was *no* net growth in college funds. Income came principally from membership subscriptions and from the interest derived from an earlier fixed deposit of \$575,000 for 2 years. Course fees from the various CME programmes amounted to a sizable \$26,702 and this definitely helped in meeting the increasing expenses. Besides the once-off contribution by the college to the Post-Graduate Medical Library, major items of expenditure were: i) staff salaries; ii) utility charges; iii) publishing costs of the Singapore Family Physician; iv) expenses for CME courses and; v) security and general maintenance of the college premises.

A total sum of \$600,000 in 3 lots of \$200,000 each have been placed in fixed deposits with our principal bank for periods of 3, 6 and 12 months with effect from January 1989. This has been done to enable us to take advantage of the likely increase in FD Interest rates with the current upturn in the National Economy. It is very important, that this FD sum of \$600,000 be untouched in the foreseeable future so as to form the minimum "reserves" of the College.

It is likely that there would be substantial increases in the items of expenditure that presently form the bulk of our cost of running the College (ie salaries, utilities, maintenance and security). Besides this, it is also prudent that the College should maintain a small positive balance for each financial year to be set aside should some sudden need arise. This would prevent the need to draw from the minimum reserves of \$600,000 in FD. With these in mind, the need for the small increase in the subscription for the various categories of membership, would be seen in better perspective. Council has decided against increasing CME course fees in view of the growing importance of CME and the present policy of the Singapore Medical Council of encouraging self-motivated CME.

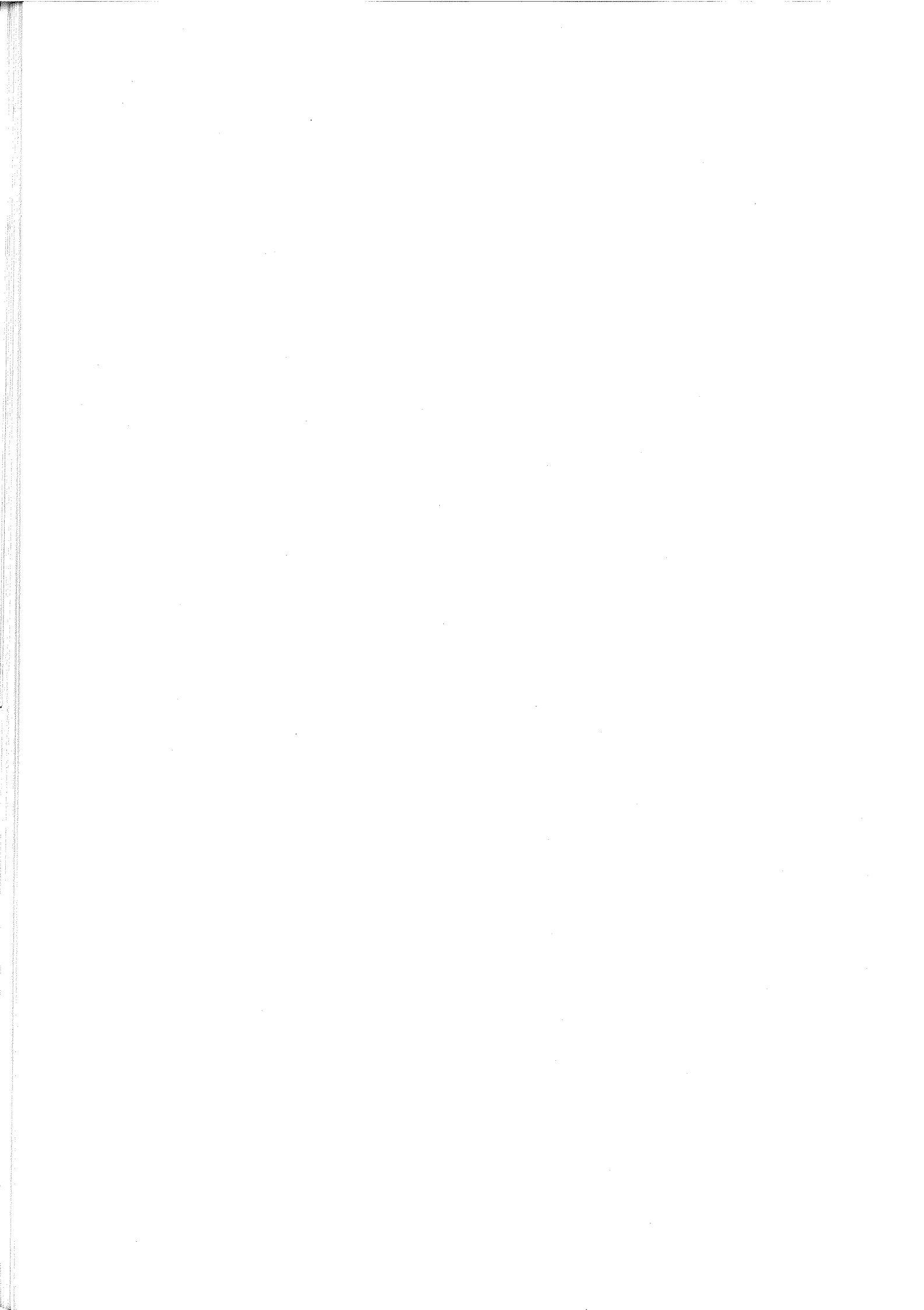


